ARRIVAL OF THE ATLANTIC.

FOUR DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. New York, October 28 .- The Collins steamer Atlantic, from Liverpool, with thates to the 15th inst. arrived here at 8 o'

clock this evening. Her intelligence is four days later than previous advices. The steamer Asia arrived out at 8 o'block on the morning of the 13th.

'ed office and appointed a new ministry, viz: Pidal for Foreign Affairs; Seisse for Finance; Nocedal for the Interior; Arzuela for Justice; Urlistando for War and Lersundi for the Marine department .-There are no further particulars.
