Tugspay, Jan. 6 -In the Senate an election for President pro tempore was held, to supply the place of Mr. Bught, who it was understood would be unable to fill the chair in consequence of a brief absence from the city. The choice of the Senate fell upon Mr. Mason, of Virginia. The disputed Iowa election case, involving the right of Mr. Harlan to a seat in the Senate, was then called up and debated at considerable length by Messrs. Butler and theyer in support of the majority report of the Committee on the Judiciary, denying the validity of Mr. Harlan's election, and by Messrs. Toombs and Pugh in delence of the minority report of the same committee, maintaining the legality of the sitting members's tenure of his seat. It being admitted on both sides that a quorum of the Senate of Iowa was not present at the joint convention of the Legislature of that State, it was maintained by Messrs. Butler and Geyer that such joint convention was not competent to other hand it was contended that inasmuch as the Legislature of Iowa had, in an act providing for the election of Senators, prescribed that a " majority of the members of a joint convention should be competent to elect, it followed that such election was valid it only a majority of such convention was actually secured to any candidate, without regard to the composition of that majority, whether consisting in a majority of both Houses of the Legislature, or the forger. He complimented the Northern public men who had stood up fearlessly against the prejudices of their section, and rejoiced at the accession of national men on the floor of the House.

Mr. Davis, of Maryland, followed in a speech remarkable for its fluency and power, in which he undertook to show that the result of the election had settled nothing so far as the Democracy were concerned, but that it had shown the Republicans that this country can never be governed upon mere sectional issues. He considered the American party, feeble though it appeared to be in the late contest, as the one upon which, in reality, the people must rely

Both these speeches commanded the undivided attention of the House and galleries, and confirmed the title of their authors to the front rank of parliamentary debaters. When Mr. Davis concluded, Mr. Cadwalader, of Pennsylvama, briefly reviewed some of the arguments just advanced. Mr. Barclay, of Pennsylvania, obtained the floor, and the House adjourned .- N. Int.
