Cooper, that he would be com-pelled to abandon said Li, it Boat and offered the said Cooper salvage if he would tow said Light Boat into port. The said Cooper offered to tow said boat into Cape Henry, but that the Captain of the said Light Boat objected, and colared there was no chance of getting said Light Boat into the Cape, on account of the ice and northwest winds That said Captain Cooper then endeavored to tow said Light Boat into Ocracoke Inlet, but night coming on wind being northeast, could not enter. 
