THE colored citizens of Indiana seem to be cutting their eye testh, and waking to the true inwardness of their relations to the Republican party. They are getting tired of pulling the chestnuts out of the fire for the big and little white bosses. They held a big meeting in Indianapolis last week at which were present many of the most prominent colored man in the State, among them E. C. Cooper, editor of the Freeman. After rousing speeches by him and others the following resolutions were ununimously adopted :

Be it resolved. That it is the sense of this meeting that the time has arrived for colored voters to display the same independence of choice in local elections that other pationalities do-notably, Germans and Americans, and that now and in the future we will, without excuse or apology, support our friends, regardless of their politi. cal afficiations; and be it further

Resolved, That any man who believes that colored children should not be allowed to git in the public schools with white children is not fit to receive the votes of colored men. Be it further

Resolved. That the speech of Representative Cheadle of this State, delivered in the National House of Representatives against the seating of John M. Langston because of his color, was unrepublican and tieserving of the condemnation of colored voters everywhere.

A notable feature of this meeting was, in addition to the number of prominent colored men participating in it, the presence of the pastors of three of the colored churches.-Star.
