THE PROCLAMATION. GOVERNOR FOWLE CALLS UPON THE PEOPLE OF NORTH CAROLINA TO OBSERVE THANKSGIVING.

The following Thanksgiving Proclamation has been issued by Gov. Fowle: That the independence of the American colonies was secured there has been no period of our history as a State in which Divine Providence has blessed us with more abundant returns for labor or indicated more clearly His purpose to preserve our civil and political liberties.

Now, therefore, that public acknowledgment of our gratitude to Almighty God, for His great goodness to us as a State, and His abundant blessing upon our people, is due.
