STATE NEWS.

THE LATEST HAPPENINGS, AS GATHERED FROM OUR EXCHANGES AND ELSEWHERE.

State Chronicle: The oldest mine in the State is owned by J. D. Capps of Johnson county. It is 40 years old and did a good work. Between 50 and 100 diamonds have been found in the well county. One of them, the largest ever found in the South, was on exhibition at the Paris world's Fair. The actual allowance or quota for North Carolina's navy reserve militia is \$223,360. It has cost \$5,000 to equip the battalion. The war department furnished all equipments.

The burning to death of Mrs. Sylvia Jinnett, aged widow of Eikeville township, Wayne county is reported by the Goldsboro Dispatch. Her clothes became ignited from a flying spark.

Mr. W. A. Anson who owns a large cotton farm in Louisiana, tells us a Concord Standard that, notwithstanding the excellent soil there, highly adapted to the growth of cotton and corn, he does not make as much clear money as if farming operations in North Carolina. Expenses are greater there than in this State.

Oxford Day: Shortly before 8 o'clock this afternoon a young man named Russell, employed by J. J. Moore, went into the county jail to feed the prisoners. Five of the colored men sentenced to the work house at the last court jumped upon Russell, overpowered him, shut him in a cell and made their escape. The names of the five who got out are Dick Jefferys, Roger Yancey, Robert England, Jim Green and Daniel Pollock.

Laurelburg Exchange: Atkinson, the man who was on trial here some weeks ago for breaking into the La Laurens post office, was tried at the Federal Court in Charlotte last week and sentenced to two years' imprisonment in the State penitentiary.

Montro E. Grier: Mr. Elms Passer, a young man aged about 18 years, son of Mr. D. H. Passer of New Salem township, met with a serious accident a few days ago. He was attending to the machinery at his cotton gin and was handling the press. When he was caught in the band and had both arms broken below the elbow and shoulder dislocated. The band was thrown off or he would undoubtedly have been killed.

Charlotte News: James McCarthy is a young white man who was some time ago convicted of robbing a store in Placemine and sentenced to three years in the chain gang. His name would have expired next April. McCarthy believed exceedingly well and was made a "trusty." Three months ago a woman named Farrington was placed on the chain gang for an offence against the laws. The "trusty" got his hands on the woman and they planned a Christmas escapement. Last night stealthily unlocked the woman's cell and together they put out on their homely road, direction and destination unknown.

Hickory Mercury: About ten days ago Mr. Keever at Granite Falls shot a duck for dinner. While dressing it, two pieces of pure gold were found in its crop. This created a curiosity as to where it came from. They speculated that it came out of the air from a well which was dug about two months ago. On examining this dirt, other pieces were soon found. From this and other proofs which are rapidly being produced it is thought that the whole village of Granite Falls is directly over one of the richest gold mines in this country.

Explanation of Weather Signals

As displayed from our office daily (except Sundays):

A white flag, fair. Blue flag, rain or snow. Half white and half blue, local rains. White flag with black centre, cold wave. The black triangular flag is a Temperature signal, and when displayed above Weather flags indicates that it will be warmer, and when below weather flags, that it will be cooler, and when not displayed at all the temperature will remain stationary.
