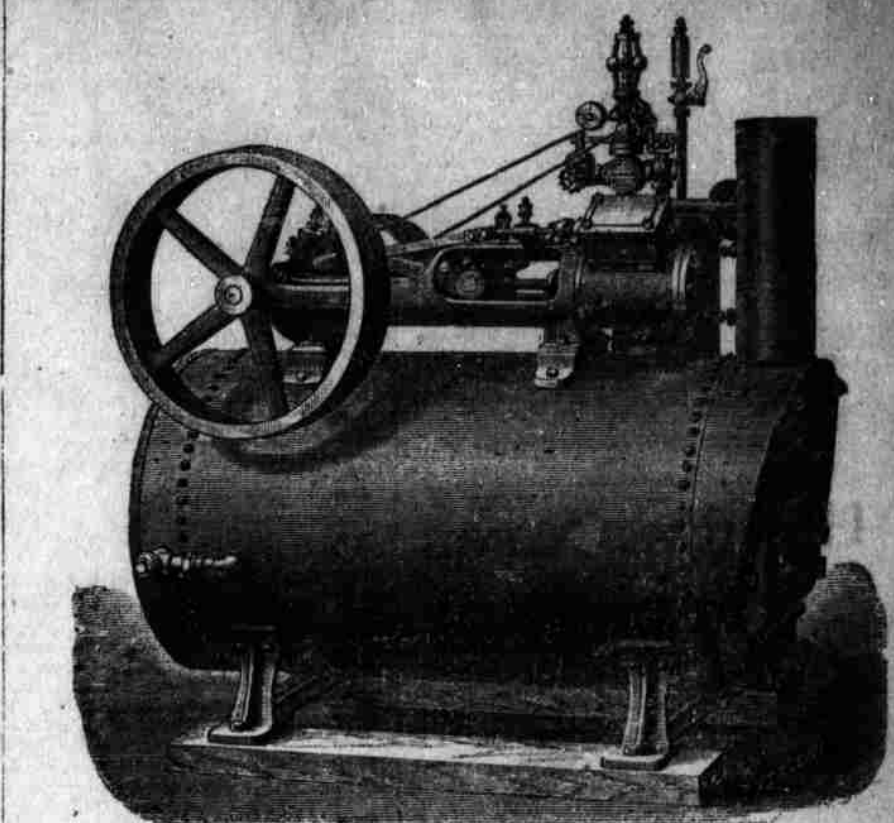

THE ENGINE

Is a Centre Crank pattern and of the class known as straight line engine. This style admits of most symmetrical, compact and rigid construction, with fewest parts, and our design brings all in such position as to be easily gotten at by the operator. The frame, or bed is cast in one solid piece and so designed with regard to form and proper distribution of metal as to afford greatest strength and firmness, and arranged to catch all oil drippings. The cylinder end of this frame is turned accurately in lathe and the cross-head guides, which are cast with and made a part of main frame, are bored out with concave surfaces in exact line with the cylinder. The cross head is substantially made and fitted with improved adjustable gun-metal gibs or followers to take up any wear on guides. The cylinders are cast of carefully mixed iron, insuring greatest tenacity and density, as are also the pistons and valves, which are finished in the most thorough and workmanlike manner; the cylinders are covered with an A-best quality having Russia iron jacket fitted with brass band rimming, giving a handsome appearance. The connecting rod is made extra strong and is provided with adjustable brass boxes at each end, with wrought straps, keys self oilers, etc. Great firmness and strength are secured in crank shaft, which is of solid steel, counterbalanced, and has bearings extra wide. The well established D slide valve is used of proper proportions adapted to the service and speed of the Engines. The eccentric for operating valve is arranged so that by simply changing a cap screw from one hole to another the Engine is adjusted to run in the opposite direction. Each Engine is supplied with throttle valve and best make of safety governor which insures the stopping of the Engine should the governor belt break; this governor is also provided with Sewyer's valve attachment and speed adjuster, by which speed of Engine can be varied. When mounted on Boiler, Engine is attached in such manner as to avoid the difficulties of expansion and contraction.

THE BOILER

Is furnished on a kids, being of the Self contained type and of the class known as Cornish Return Tubular, the same style as are almost universally used upon ocean steamers, which is a positive guarantee of their safety and efficiency. By this form is obtained the most compact and substantial construction, with largest amount of effective heating surface, thus securing best results from the combustion of the fuel and making them economical in the use of same. The fire box, having grate surface in front and combustion chamber at rear end, extends horizontally through Boiler; it consists of a large cylindrical flue surrounded by water, and receives the pressure upon an such a front point, thus affording greatest resistance and strength. The advantages of our ample grate surface, which is of unusual length and fitted with extra heavy grates of n-w pattern, have been highly appreciated, particularly when wood is used as fuel. The cover over rear end of Boiler and back of combustion chamber is now provided with an improved patented fire proof lining, which is very durable and specially adapted for protecting the head and retaining the heat within the Boiler. Special attention is called to the substantial new front shown, now supplied on all sizes of eight horse power and over. Another special feature of this Boiler, which has been fully appreciated by Cotton Ginners especially, is its freedom from danger of fire from escaping sparks; it will be seen that as the fire travels full length of Boiler twice, passing horizontally through fire box and back through the flues, very few, if any, sparks escape into stack, and such as do are caught by the arrester. The Boilers are built of best grade 60,000 pound tensile strength steel plate, and furnished with best wrought lap-welded tubes.
