EASTER SERVICE.

A BEACON REPORTER VISITS THE EASTER CELEBRATIONS AT ST. DAVID'S, AND THE ADVENT ATROPER.

ST. DAVID'S CHURCH.

Services were held in this church on Easter Day with a large congregation in attendance. She church was beautifully decorated with flowers, and the services rendered according to this High Festival were engaged in with true devotion.

In the afternoon the Sunday School had its Easter celebration, which was a joyful occasion. The classes entered the church in procession with banners, singing "Onward Christian Soldiers" in unison with the music rendered by the efficient organist. After a short devotional service and an address by the rector, the Easter offerings for missions were presented, and cards delivered to each pupil, all departing, it is hoped, with the impression that Easter teaches not only the resurrection of the body hereafter, but that of the spiritual life at present.

CHURCH OF ADVENT, ROPER.

On 1st Sunday after Easter an unusual large congregation met in this beautiful church and participated heartily in the services of the Church still dwelling upon the glorious subject of the resurrection.

The sacred appearances of the sanctuary was ever increased by the profusion of exquisite flowers placed upon the altar and elsewhere, beautiful to the sight and suggestive to the mind and heart of the glorious transformation of our bodies and spirits for eternity. The Easter celebration of the Sunday School was postponed for a week, in consideration of the rector's monthly appointment, thereby affording him the pleasure of participating in the exercises.

At 3:30 p. m., the different classes consisting in all of seventy-three pupils, entered the church with beautiful banners, each pupil also with an appropriate badge, singing the processional hymn to the notes of the organ. A short service was held by the rector, assisted in music by the devoted and invaluable organist. The children were catechised by the rector, followed by a logical and valuable address from the earnest and benignant superintendent, Mr. T. W. Blount, concluding with his presentation of a valuable banner to the prize class. The appropriate response of the little girl receiving it for her class was impressive. The superintendent then presented to each pupil a very neat Easter card. The offerings of the school for missions were twenty-eight dollars.

An Act to Change the Time of Holding the Courts of Washington, Tyrrell and Dare Counties.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF NORTH CAROLINA DO ENACT:

SECTION 1. That the superior courts of the counties of Washington, Tyrrell and Dare shall be held as follows:

Tyrrell—Seventh Monday after the first Monday in March and September.

Dare—Eighth Monday after the first Monday in March and September.

Washington—Ninth Monday after the first Monday in March and September.

SEC. 2. That all processes, original, motion or final, in civil or criminal actions issued and returnable to the spring term of said counties as held before this act shall be returnable to the term as by this act established, and all persons who have been recognized, bound or summoned to appear at the spring term of said courts or who shall be so recognized, bound or summoned are hereby required to appear at the term specified in this act.

SEC. 3. That this act shall be in force from and after its ratification. Ratified the 6th day of March, A. D. 1893.
