**Proceedings County Commissioners.**

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session Dec. 3rd, 1894.

The newly elected Board composed of Jos. Skittleharpe, B. D. Latham, W. C. Marriner, H. M. Snell and H. A. Litebfield met and qualified before Thos. J. Marriner, Clerk Superior Court.

The first business before the Board being the election of a Chairman, on motion Jos Skittleharpe was re-elected for the ensuing two years.

Isaac T. Hassell, Sheriff-elect, failed to present his bond, and on motion the office of Sheriff was declared vacant, and on motion Levi Blount was elected Sheriff for the ensuing two years.

Levi Blount, having been elected Sheriff by the Board, appeared and presented his three several bonds—his official bond in the sum of \$10,000 with J. W. Blount, W. H. Hampton and J. A. Chesson as sureties. His bond for State taxes in the sum of \$5,000, with J. E. Blount and W. H. Hampton as sureties. And his bond for County School, Poor and special taxes in the sum of \$28,000 with Thos. W. Blount, E. F. Blount, Asa Phelps and W. H. Hampton as sureties. Bond accepted and ordered recorded.

Miles S. Elliott, Clerk Superior Court-elect, presented his bond in the sum of \$10,000 with Palemon John, Richard Elliott, Z. W. Evans, J. Q. A. Wood and A. W. English as sureties, which was rejected on account of the insufficiency of the sureties. Ordered that the Chairman of this Board notify the resident Judge of this Judicial District of the facts in accordance with Sec. 76, first Vol. of the Code of North Carolina.

W. H. Stubbs, Register of Deeds-elect, presented his official bond in the sum of \$5,000 with Josephus H. Snell and Dempsey Spruill as sureties. Bond accepted, approved and ordered to be recorded.

E. B. Latham Constable-elect of Plymouth Township tendered his official bond in the sum of \$500, with A. O. Gaylord and E. P. Latham as sureties. Bond accepted and ordered to be recorded.

Thos. J. Bassitt, Treasurer-elect, tendered his two several bonds, his bond for general county and special tax funds in the sum of \$14,500 with Abram Newberry, Jno B. Chesson, E. R. Latham, S. M. Whaley, J. E. Norman, A. W. Snell and G. W. Harney as sureties, and his bond in the sum of \$8,500 for the common school fund, with Josephus H. Snell, C. T. Spruill, Rufus Swain, Isaac T. Hassell, Annie Latham, G. W. Harney and J. F. Norman as sureties. Bond accepted, approved and ordered recorded.

Ordered that Jos. A. Harrison's bid for keeping the poor for the ensuing year be accepted, which is as follows: To take charge of the Poor House for the year 1895 and comply with the same obligations as heretofore for the sum of \$100.

Ordered that A. J. Leggett's bid to build a bridge over Peacock swamp be accepted, which is to build the bridge according to the specifications now in the hands of the Register of Deeds, for the sum of \$84.50.

Ordered that G. W. White's bid for furnishing coffins for the poor be accepted, which is \$2.95 each.

Ordered that Levi Craddock have that portion of the poor house land on which he formerly lived for the year 1895 for the sum of \$15.00.

**SECOND DAY, Tuesday Dec. 4.**

Ordered that Dr. W. H. Ward's bid for professional service to the poor house for the ensuing year be accepted, which is the same as last year.

Ordered that Hornthal & Alexander's bid for furnishing the poor house, Court House & Jail with supplies for the ensuing year be accepted, which is to furnish goods at 12 1/2 per cent on cost.

Ordered that Levi Blount be allowed the sum of \$88.30 for feeding prisoners in jail, summoning Jurors, notifying Electors, notifying Inspectors of Election, amount paid Solicitor, &c., as per account filed.

Ordered that Dr. W. H. Ward be allowed the sum of \$28.00 for professional services to the Poor House as per account filed.

Ordered that Dr. Robt. W. Smith be allowed the sum of \$10.00 for assisting Dr. Ward at the poor house.

Ordered that J. P. Hilliard be allowed the sum of \$25.45 for posting county orders allowed, Clerk of Returning Board, issuing county orders, &c., as per account filed.

Ordered that E. H. Leary be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for 1 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that W. H. Hampton be allowed the sum of \$12.61 for provisions, etc., furnished poor house, jail and court house as per account filed.

Ordered that J. H. Wiggins be allowed the sum of \$4.00 for 2 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that Thos. J. Marriner be allowed the sum of \$12.03 for half fees in case State vs Jas Moody, recording election returns and for copy of same to Secretary of State.

Ordered that Thos. J. Lewis be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for 1 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that W. J. Jackson be allowed the sum of \$8.00 for 2 days service as Inspector of election and 2 days on Returning board.

Ordered that Thos. S. Swain be allowed the sum of \$7.17 for services as Registrar of election and 2 days on Returning board.

Ordered that Jno. H. Hughes be allowed the sum of \$2.50 for 1 day as police at the polls in Lee's Mills township and one day as guard conveying Jas Moody to jail.

Ordered that Henry W. Bateman be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for one days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that A. L. Cahoon be allowed the sum of \$3.00 for use of house and damage to same in holding election in Scuppernon township.

Ordered that Simon Collins be allowed the sum of \$1.00 for 1 days service as door keeper at election in Scuppernon township.

Ordered that Richard E. Dick be allowed the sum of \$1.00 for 1 days service as police at the polls in Scuppernon township.

Ordered that J. F. Belang be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for 1 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that M. M. Alexander be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for lamps, oil, paper &c., for use of election in Scuppernon township.

Ordered that the Roanoke Beacon be allowed the sum of \$4.16 for publishing the proceedings of last meeting.

Ordered that the Roanoke E. R. & L. Co. be allowed the sum of \$2.47 for lumber furnished for use of election in Plymouth township and amount paid for labor and dray.

Ordered that Chas. G. Spencer be allowed the sum of \$1.00 for 2 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that W. C. Marriner be allowed the sum of \$2.08 for half fees on bill of cost in case State vs Jas Moody.

Ordered that Jno. J. Rowe be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for 1 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that H. T. Hassell be allowed the sum of \$14.24 for services as Registrar of election in Scuppernon township and two days service on Returning board.

Ordered that Jas. H. Smith be allowed the sum of \$8.83 for services as Registrar of election in Plymouth township.

Ordered that W. J. Barnes be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for 1 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that L. C. Marriner be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for 1 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that J. N. Padgett be allowed the sum of \$3.00 for one coffin furnished the county.

Ordered that Jas. A. Chesson be allowed the sum of 73cts for half fees in case State vs Jas Moody.

Ordered that H. A. Spruill be allowed the sum of \$1.50 for one days service as police at the polls in Lee's Mills township.

Ordered that W. C. Marriner be allowed the sum of \$4.50 for 4 days service waiting on Grand Jury.

Ordered that J. A. Chesson be allowed the sum of \$9.55 for services as Registrar of election in Lee's Mills township.

Ordered that J. A. Harrison be allowed the sum of \$9.08 for services as keeper of the poor house one month and making garments for inmates.

Ordered that Adderson Everett be allowed the sum of \$3.00 for waiting on Fall term of Court three days.

Ordered that the Plymouth Drug Co. be allowed the sum of \$3.15 for medicines furnished the poor house.

Ordered that Jno. H. Clark be allowed the sum of \$2.00 for 1 days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that Eli Stewart be allowed the sum of \$1.00 for two days service as Inspector of election.

Ordered that B. W. Clagun be allowed the sum of \$2.12 for lumber nails and labor raising off polling place in Lee's Mills township.

Ordered that the sum of \$51.08 be allowed to the various officers and witnesses as per statement filed by Thos. J. Marriner, Clerk Superior Court, the same being one half fees in State cases determined at the Fall term of Washington County Superior Court.

W. T. Freeman presented his account as County Treasurer which was audited and approved.
