It is simply a double step-ladder and can be constructed by any one at all handy with tools in a short time, the railing consisting of gas pipe, the lower ends of which should be deeply inserted into the ground. Where a wire fence has to be crossed frequently in some part of the way locally, this device is of great value.—New York Tribune.
