### PLYMOUTH GRADED SCHOOL RULES.

DEAR EDITOR :-- I have been requested to have published in your next issue the following extracts from the rules adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Plymouth Graded School as are of inimediate need of publicity, and of general interest. Full copies of said rules in book form are being prepared and can be had by any one interested therein by application to the Secretary of the Board, Mr. W. M. Bateman. They will be ready in about ten days.

The co-operation of the parents of the children is earnestly requested by the Board, in order that the successful operation of the school may be secured.\* Yours truly,

Teachers shall not receive into their class rooms any pupil without a ticket of admission from the Principal.

They shall not permit social visits during school hours, nor allow any visitor in any way to interfere with their work, unless it he a member of this Board or of the Board of Education or persons introduced by them. They shall rigidly investigate all cases of absence or tardiness on the part of their pupils.

No teacher except the Principal shall administer corporal punishment.

Pupils must not assemble about the school premises more than fifteen minutes

by the Principal until action by the chairman, or by some other member of the Board, in his absence.

Playing games of any sort will not be allowed on the school premises, or on the street near the school. As the white school is in the center of the town and close to dwelling houses, pupils must exercise care to avoid any loud talking, or boisterous conduct.

All damage to school property above ordinary wear and tear, shall be paid for by the person committing the injury.

Pupils must not leave the school grounds during the sessions, or during recess, without permission of the Principal.

Pupils are required to be cleanly in their habits, and to be decently clothed. Any violation of these rules, when persisted in, or any improper conduct, shall when deemed necessary by the Principal, be punished by suspension, and when any pupil is suspended by the Principal, he or she shall be reinstated only upon application to the chairman of the Board. Three suspensions during any one term, shall be deemed cause for expulsion.

The schools shall be open for instruction daily from Monday to Friday, inclusive. All the schools shall open at 8:45 s. M. and close the morning session at 12, M. and the alternoon seasion shall open at 1:30 P. M. and close at 4:00 P. M. The Primary grades shall be closed half an hour earlier in both morning and afternoon sessions. Some modification of this rule may be

allowed by the Principal in case of stormy weather, or other good cause.

Besides the regular vacation from June to September, the following vacations shall occur :







before the time for opening the session.

Pupils are required to leave the premises in the afternoon immediately upon the dismissal of the school.

Pupils shall not be allowed to leave the school before its close, except upon the written request of parent or guardian, which request shall set forth the reason for which said leave is requested, and the Principal shall judge as to the sufficiency of said reason-or for some urgent reason of which the teacher shall be the judge. This rule shall not apply to special arrangements made in advance concerning absences.

Pupils who are absent or tardy must bring to the teacher a written excuse, signed by parent or guardian. These excuses must be referred to the Principal. If they are judged by him to be insufficient, he must take such action as seems necessary. No teacher shall in any case fail to require the written excuse, and when not presented, the pupil must at once be sent home to obtain it.

Pupils who shall, in or about the school premises, use or write any profane or obscene, or valgar language, or who shall use tob-cco in any form, shall be suspended




