ROLL OF CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS WHO SERVED FROM WASHINGTON COUNTY.

EDITOR ROANOKE BEACON:

I send herewith rolls of the men who served in the Army and Navy of the Confederate States from Washington county, as far as I have been able to secure them.

The county had men in the following commands: The 1st, 3rd, 4th, 7th, 17th, 18th, 32nd, 56th, 66th and 71st Regiments of Infantry. The 1st, 2nd and 3rd N. C. Cavalry, and some in a Georgia Regiment of Cavalry. Quite a number were in the 10th N. C. Heavy Artillery and many in the Edenton Bell Battery and Montgomery Blues, both Light Artillery. The county was well represented in the Navy. The aggregate number is 381, as will be seen by the rolls, but I am confident this number is not as large as it should be, and therefore ask that the old veterans and the sons and daughters of those who have died will carefully read the rolls of the various commands, and if any name has been overlooked it be sent to you, that all who wore the gray may be recorded. After I have secured the names of all who went from Washington county, it is my intention to have a "Record Book" made and placed in the Clerk's office for the use of posterity. If any name is omitted from that book it will not be my fault. I specially ap-

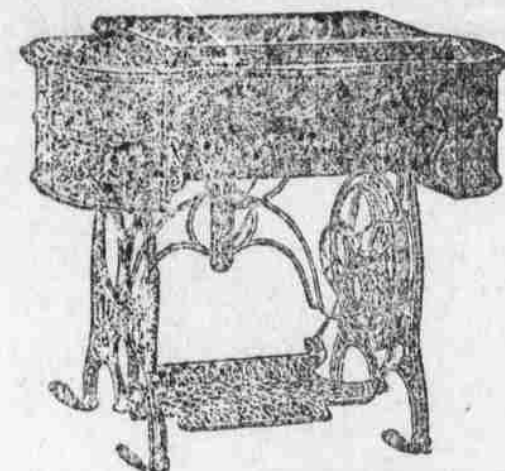
