An Associated Press dispatch from Paris dated April 9, says:

Ex-Queen Isabella of Spain, grandmother of King Alfonso, died here at 9:45 o'clock this morning, of influenza with complications.

The American embassy, which is opposite the palace castle on the Avenue Kleber, the late Queen's residence, was early informed of the queen's death and Ambassador Porter was among the first to call and sign the palace register.

The Infantas Isabella, Eulalie and Marie, daughters of the late queen, were at the bedside when she died. | som by J. O. Everett.
