#### How Meerschaum Is Mined. "Meerschaum is mined like coal," said a pipe dealer. "It is a soft, soaplike stone, and in Asia Minor its min-

ing is an important industry. "The crude meerschaum is called hamtash. It is yellowish white in color and a red clay coat or skin envelops It. The blocks cost from \$25 to \$200 a cartload. They are soft enough to cut with a knife.

"Tnese blocks in summer are dried by exposure to the sun. In winter a heated room is necessary.

'r'inally, the meerschaum blocks ar; sorted into twelve grades, wrapped in cotton and packed in cases with the greatest care.

"The bulk of all this meerschaum goes to Vlenna. There the best pipemakers in the world live."-Philadelphia Bulletin.


