The most successful year of the school closed its sessions Friday, May 18th. The number enrolled during the past year was 123, with an average of 80 for daily attendance. The number of absentees was nearly 5000 less during the past year as compared with the sessions of '04 and '05. That the school is being properly patronized, is due in a large measure to the character of the men who constitute its Board of Trustees. Thos. W. Blount, Chm.; L. G. Roper, Treas.; L. B. Johnston, J. W. Chesson, and Ernest Lewis, make up the membership of the Board. Successful men of affairs in their own special lines of business, they have adopted the same methods in the conduct of the school, and the educational interest of the people of Roper has most certainly been entrusted to faithful hands.

The exercises consisted of drills, dialogues, marches, and pantomimes. The excellent execution of their several parts by the pupils bore proof of the hard, persistent, and systematic training they received from their teachers.

Hon. John H. Small delivered a very interesting and instructive address on "The Spirit of Service." The address was indicative of the man. Thoroughly conversant with the needs of the people, his speech bore unmistakable evidence of his deep interest in their welfare. The speaker was presented by the Rev. Mr. Cotton, of the N. C. Methodist conference.

The medal for scholarship was won by Master John T. McAllister. The department medal was awarded to Miss Millie Estelle Spruill. These medals were the gift of Miss Augusta Carstarphen, in charge of the Intermediate Department, and were presented in a happy manner by Hon. Thos. W. Blount.

The class in music, under Mrs. Leon Lewis, the musical director, added to the entertainment very materially with a selection of well-rendered pieces.

How Meerschaum is Mined. "Meerschaum is mined like coal," said a pipe dealer. "It is a soft, soap-like stone, and in Asia Minor its mining is an important industry. The crude meerschaum is called hamtash. It is yellowish white in color and a red clay coat or skin envelops it. The blocks cost from \$25 to \$200 a cartload. They are soft enough to cut with a knife. "These blocks in summer are dried by exposure to the sun. In winter a heated room is necessary. Finally, the meerschaum blocks are sorted into twelve grades, wrapped in cotton and packed in cases with the greatest care. "The bulk of all this meerschaum goes to Vienna. There the best pipe-makers in the world live."—Philadelphia Bulletin.
