Generate Sufficient Heat to Melt Surrounding Snow.

The salsapilla or snowball of the Alps is a dainty little plant about three inches high, bearing two pendant-fringed white or violet bells on each flower stalk.

A modified form of the same heat producing power may be noted in the foxglove.
