Being one of the oldest and largest business houses in this county, it naturally caused much comment when it was learned that Mr. Louis P. Hornthal had voluntarily become bankrupt.

Some are so prone to unkind and uncharitable criticism (and justly so in many instances, we regret to say) that we feel it no more than fair to Mr. Hornthal to say that the Court before which the transaction was made, when he offered to surrender his personal jewelry, etc., remarked that it was cleaner and freer from any appearance of fraud than any like occurrence that had ever come before it.

The main cause of the failure seems to have been Mr. Hornthal's easy nature—in not forcing to settlement those in financial straits themselves, owing to short crops, low prices, etc. In fact we have heard several say he was the best friend they ever had, and regrets at his misfortune are heard on every hand, while many are anxious that when everything is settled he may be in position to do so, and will decide to continue in business here.
