

A TEMPERANCE RALLY.

Wednesday a Red Letter Day For Prohibition in Washington County.

3000 PEOPLE WELCOME THEIR CHIEF, AND THE CHAMPION OF PROHIBITION.

Governor Robt. B. Glenn arrived in Plymouth at 6:50 Tuesday evening over the A. C. L., was met at the depot by a committee of ladies and gentlemen who escorted him to Hotel Brinkley.

Early Wednesday morning a light rain set in but soon stopped, leaving the air fresh and bracing, and the people for miles around began to pour into the town, and the town people were making ready to help the visitors enjoy the day and make the occasion a Temperance Rally in deed and in truth, and they did.

At 9:30 the N & S train rolled in with three cars loaded with men, women and children from all parts of the county. The boat with the Band and a party from Williamston arrived about this time. The mid-day train on the A. C. L., and the north bound N & S., brought delegations from neighboring towns, and suit the people came until there were something like three thousand people on our streets.

At 11:45 twenty mounted Marshals and fully three hundred school children lined up in front of the hotel where they joined the Naval Reserves and band, a few minutes later the carriage which was to convey the Governor and party drew up with bunting flags and banners flying. The Governor came upon the scene and stepped into the carriage, with him in the carriage were: Lt. C. Latham, of the Naval Reserves, Chairman W. S. Davenport, of the Anti-Saloon League and A. O. Gaylord, Esq.

The procession formed of Water Street as follows: Chief Director of Military Escort, Dr. A. W. Disso-sway, mounted in full dress uniform and saber, commanded the parade, Chief Marshal, A. W. Swann and his first assistant, M. W. Norman, led the parade, then came the Naval Reserves led by the Williamston Cornet Band and in command of Lt. J. L. Phelps; then came the Speakers carriage with a mounted escort; then came the schools, hundreds of sweet children, from 6 to 18 years of age, led in double file by Supt. C. J. Everett and Prof. McCanniss, and marshaled in perfect order by the various teachers, while twenty well mounted Marshals kept up the rear and side lines. The parade thus formed moved up Water to Jefferson, up Jefferson to Main, down Main to Washington, out Washington to 5th Avenue, up the Avenue to Jefferson down Jefferson to Main thence down Main to the Court House, in front of which, yet protected by the per- tico, amid festoons of red, white and blue, was arranged the speaker's stand, to this the great Governor of our State was escorted, and then and there, in a few well chosen words, by presented to the vast audience by A. O. Gaylord, Esq.

The speaker arose amid a great applause, said he came here to speak but did not expect to have all the people of Washington county out to hear him. For nearly two hours he held his audience almost spell-bound by his powerful and eloquent appeals for the cause of Prohibition. By his magnificent oratory he swayed the multitude, by his powerful arguments that were undeniable, he convinced the vast assembly that he was defending the cause of right, and as their Chief Officer, he was but doing his sworn duty when he was fighting the demon, whiskey, that in so doing he was defending the State, the best interests, the peace and pros- perity of the people, the homes, the women and children, of North Carolina and his God.

During the entire time he was speaking he was listened to with such marked attention that he made reference to it, saying that he had not only been given one of the largest, but possibly the most hearty and royal reception in Plymouth, that he had received at any point in the State. He seemed to emphasize with pleasure, the fact that, though he is the Commander-in-Chief of the military forces of the State, Wash- ington county is the first place he has been recognized as such by such a grand military display, he com- plimented the men and officers very highly on the wide reputation they have won. This was not done on the stand, but to at the depot in a con- versation with the Beacon Man.

The speaker discussed the whiskey question in all its borrows in a very forcible, yet pathetic and inoffensive way and he challenged any man to answer his arguments against the saloon, sale, manufacture or use of whiskey. He denounced as false the statement of men who boast that they have had the honor of drinking with him since he has been Govern- or of North Carolina.

At the close of the speech all the schools sang appropriate temperance

songs and the Governor joined with them while he shook hands with all who passed by.

From the open expressions heard on the streets after the speaking, it is believed that much good will result from the Governor's appeal.

The people of Washington county had with them on Wednesday a great man, they had a big day, a great rally, now let them keep it up until the 26th of May and all will be well.

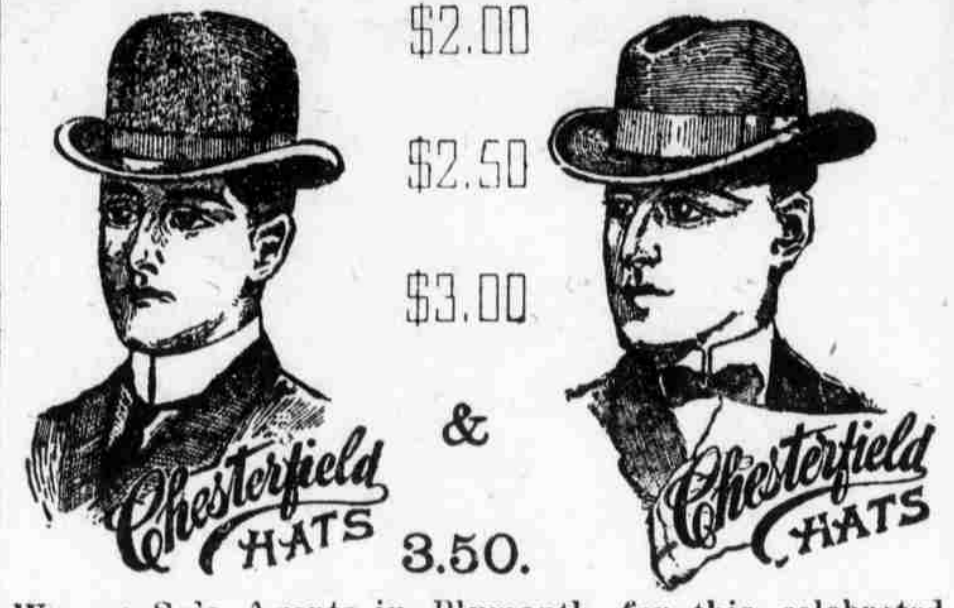
