with his regiment, and the assistance of one company of infantry, one of cavalry and a battery of artillery, surprised the garrison at day-break, capturing a number of prisoners and more stores and munitions of war than they could get away with. This fight occurred in the streets of the town, the defenders using the dwellings and customs house as screens from the hail of bullets poured upon them by their fearless assailants. The gunboats in the river opened fire on the town at short range, setting fire to the buildings, and when the conflict had terminated scarcely a dozen were left standing within the corporate limits. And for a long period after this every few years Plymouth suffered a disastrous fire. Col. Lamb and his little army not being able to drive off the gunboats in the river, withdrew from the town, and the Federal authorities immediately undertook its fortification. They made fruitful use of their time for a year or more, building forts, erecting breastworks and cutting away the forest growth near the town.

On the afternoon of Sunday, April 17, 1864, Gen. R. F. Hoke attacked the town, the battle being terrific and desperate for three days. It was during this engagement that the iron-clad Albemarle appeared upon the scene, driving off or sinking the ships of the enemy after heroic fighting. When this battle was over there was little remaining of the town except smoldering ruins, several wrecked forts and the hastily constructed graves of several hundred dead. General Matt W. Ransom was with General Hoke at the capture of Plymouth. A relic of these days is the house of Mr. W. Fletcher Ausbon, in the side of which I counted 41 bullet holes. The scars made by shells from the gunboats are still observable on the chimney and door riding of this residence. A Confederate sharpshooter was mortally wounded on the second floor of this building. This interesting house is at the corner of Washington and Third streets. For a time the Yankees used the M. E. church as a stable, and they stripped the weatherboarding from the Episcopal church to use as fuel.

On May 5, 1864, Captain J. W. Cook, commanding the Albemarle left Plymouth, and followed by two small tenders steamed out into the Albemarle Sound, where it found seven heavily armed Federal gunboats. These immediately upon sighting the Albemarle ran sixteen miles down the sound, but finally gave battle, for many hours their fifty-five guns hammering the mailed sides of their pursuer. Over a hundred holes were shot through the smokestack of the Albemarle. Before coming opposite Plymouth, when the Albemarle was descending the Roanoke to aid
