Best Way to Drink Milk.

We live by digesting and assimilating food, not merely by eating it. Milk as a food builds up and forms body tissues and fluids and repairs waste. When taken slightly in excess the unused portion, mostly but not all, is stored in the system for future use. As is well known, fluid milk and vichy is a wholesome drink for many who can not assimilate milk alone. A pinch or two of salt in a glass of milk will produce a similar result. It aids in the easier digestion of the curds as formed in the stomach prior to digestion. It is wise for the possessor of a weak stomach to sip a glass of milk slowly instead of drinking it hurriedly. The larger the quantity of milk taken at one draught the greater the difficulty of its digestion. It may not be generally understood that hot milk taken into the system is almost immediately absorbed. It is stimulating without reaction.—Lettie's Weekly.
