the meeting in Frankfort, Ky., in the interests of the preservation of State's rights none which every Southern Governor should attend. The Baltimore Sun says of it:

"If the State and the State Government sit capively while Congress and the Federal Executive tax and mine the Constitution and deprive them of their reserved rights, then the State will have less cause to complain when they finally discover that the real affairs of government have been transferred from the State capital to Washington of the entire program of Federal aggression should be carried out; if the regulation and licensing and taxing of the corporation should be assumed by the United States; if there should be Federal regulation of factories and labor, of all trades and lines that carry mails, of all roads over which rural postman travels, there would hardly remain any reason why the States should continue the expense of maintaining legislative bodies. A movement has already begun which is designed to stem the increasing tide that is flooding to Washington a meeting will be held in Frankfort, Ky., tomorrow to make arrangement for a meeting after the fall elections of all the States, the meeting tomorrow is of a committee composed of the governors of Kentucky, South Carolina and Missouri and they will make arrangements and fix the time and place for the general meeting in the fall. That general meeting will be a conservation meeting—not a conservation of forests, mines and waterfalls but the conservation of the rights of the State which were reserved by the original thirteen when the Federal constitution was adopted."

Clipping From Washington Daily News.

Norwood Lee Simmons was born at Washington, N. C. November 25, 1885, the son of the late Honorable M. S. Simmons, the blind lawyer. At sixteen years of age he graduated at the high school of the Washington public schools, winning the "Small" history medal, the superior ship and other honors. In September, 1904, he entered the University of North Carolina, where he finished his year. He then returned home and took charge of the clerical work of his father's law office. In November, 1905, when only 18 years of age, he was licensed by an appointment by Governor Charles B. Aycock, as Counselor at Law from Beaufort County to the National Exposition at St. Louis Mo.

After he entered the University of North Carolina in September, 1905, in the law department, where he remained one year. In August, 1906, he passed the examination of the Supreme Court of North Carolina to practice law, with high honors, being highly complimented by two members and chief justice of the court. He then returned to his home and commenced the practice of law before he was 21 years of age. He then associated in practice with his father under the name of Simmons and Simmons. Just 6 months after the death of his father, leaving him with very serious responsibilities and a very large liability dependent on him. He, as a young man, just following his father's death, he associated himself in the court practice with How. W. M. Bond, of Edenton, N. C., with whom he is still associated in the practice of law. He also has an office in Roanoke, N. C., where he is associated in practice with John G. Toole, once from name, Toole and Simmons. It may be safely said he enjoys as liberally a practice for his age as any attorney in the State.

As a lawyer he has been wonderfully successful. An advocate before the bar he has few enemies, and is held in high respect as a public speaker and is recognized as a leader in the political practice of his county. For the past two years it may be safely said he has had more experience in and tried more criminal cases than any lawyer in this State for his age.

In December, 1908, he was elected Captain of the Washington Light Infantry local militia. This was an honor, he had never attempted a military school, but was elected from private life. He accepted the commission as Captain and has made an efficient and capable officer, and has received on many occasions complimentary mention by his superior officers.

He was a delegate to the Democratic Con. of Senators, Congressional and Local conventions of 1908. He has been a hard worker for the cause of Democracy. During the state and national campaign of 1908 under the direction of the State Democratic Executive Committee, he canvassed this district in behalf of the tobacco and State ticket which campaign he made with great credit to himself and good to his party. In a joint debate some of the ablest Republican speakers and leaders in this district.
