### Special Notice to Owners of dogs in the Town of Plymouth Ordinance No 18.

All persons keeping any dog or bitch in the corporate limits of the town shall pay a tax, to the constable of the town, of one dollar on said dog, and one dollar and fifty cents on such bitch. The owner of said dog or bitch shall pay the said tax before the first day of July of each and every year, and at the time of paying it shall be the duty of the constable to register such dogs or bitches in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, and not remove from the office of the clerk of the town, except by the constable for the purpose of registering dog or bitches. Such registration shall consist of the name of the owner, and the dog, if any, and a full and complete description thereof, any dog or bitch in said town not so registered and on which the said tax shall not have been paid, is hereby, after the first day of July of each year declared to be a nuisance and it shall be the duty of the constable, after first notifying the owner, if known, or if he can be found, thereof, to kill such dog or bitch, if found on the street; provided this shall apply to persons not residing in said town; whose dogs are under their charge or control. If any person shall keep or have any dog or bitch in said town after the first day of July and while the tax is due, and shall fail or refuse to pay the tax herein imposed, he shall on conviction thereof, before the Mayor or any court having jurisdiction thereof, be fined not less than two, or more than ten dollars. Each day shall constitute a separate offence
