Memphis, March 13, 1912.
Special Orders: No. 15.

1.—The North Carolina Division having been divided into Brigades, a vacancy is deemed to exist in the position of Commanding Officer of the First Brigade.

2.—Upon suitable recommendation, and in obedience to, and by, and under the authority vested in the Commander-in-Chief, by Section 19, Article V. of the Constitution, Comrade Clarence Latham, of Plymouth, N. C., is hereby appointed Commander of the First North Carolina Brigade, for the year ending June 1, 1912.

He will at once appoint his official staff, and inaugurate a campaign for the reorganization of his Brigade, and make report thereof to General Headquarters.

It is the duty and should be pride of every son of a Confederate Veteran to join this organization and to work unceasingly for its success. As we honored our fathers and the cause they so valiently championed and suffered for, let us as zealously labor to perpetuate their memory.


