The Board of County Commissioners met in Special Session April 1, 1912, pursuant to adjournment.

Present, C. Latham, Chmr., W. S. Davenport and C. B. Holmes.

Minutes read and approved. Ordered that J. E. Howell be refunded over paid tax.

Ordered that W. F. Ausbon, Milton Clagon, Henderson Norman and J. F. Belanga be and are hereby appointed tax listers for their respective townships, and 10 days for Skippersville township and 20 days for others.

Ordered that J. M. Halsey be relieved of \$600 valuation on timber sold to Foreman.

Ordered that all persons subject to road tax pay same by May 1st, 1912.

Ordered that the school election for Skippersville township on May 10, be recinded.

Ordered that on approval of Board of Education that district Nos. 1 and 2 of Skippersville township be consolidated and that an election be held at Aumack school house on May 1, 1912 to vote a tax of 15c on \$100, and 45c on poll for said district bounded as follows:—Beginning at Albenmarie Sound between the Wm. Smith and Spruill farms and running with this line Southerly to John Cahoon's line and with his Westerly to the public road and Southerly so as to include Geo. Patrick to the N. S. R. R., including all territory between this line and Chapel Swamp.


