

Iniquitous Plymouth.

It is not our custom, or wish to censure any body, but we deem it absolutely necessary that something should be said in regard to the commercial facilities of Plymouth on Sunday. We cannot understand why our people so totally disregard the day that is set aside by a higher power for rest and worship. The manner in which our officials allow the city to run makes it in fact a veritable harbor of iniquity.

For the benefit of our people we reproduce section 22 of the ordinances of The Town of Plymouth:

22—No person shall follow the business of selling goods on Sunday, except cigars and ice. Any one so offending shall upon conviction be fined two dollars and fifty cents for each offense.

If our merchants, druggists etc., are ignorant of such a law, it is due wholly to the lack of diligence of our officers.

Any article that could be obtained any week-day, can, without inconvenience, be bought on Sunday. Some few, very few, of our business men recognize the Sabbath, but they are greatly in the minority. Some go to their stores almost as regularly on Sunday as they do Monday and while they do not throw their doors wide open, a purchaser never leaves without the object of his quest, provided such is kept by the proprietor. Punch-boards, raffles, etc., afford much amusement during the day.

Very few cities or towns in the state even allow cigars to

be sold on Sunday. And why should they? It's very seldom that a person cannot obtain a supply on Saturday night for the following day. It's our idea that the selling of goods on Sunday should be confined to the necessities [emergency] of life, while a STRICT LAW should be imposed upon the luxuries or articles of any description that could just as well be purchased a day earlier.

What's the use of making laws and paying officers unless the requirements are met with? Our officials cannot, in truth, cry that they are ignorant of these conditions, for even some of them can be found at almost any time of the day at these places.
