**Judge A. O. Gaylord Dead.**

In the death of Asa O. Gaylord, Esq., aged 53 years, which occurred on Friday evening, January 29th, at 4:30 o'clock, after an illness of about ten days, the community loses one of its most useful and honored citizens; the wife a loving and devoted husband, the children a kind and indulgent father and the church a loyal and consecrated member.

The deceased was born and raised on a Long Acre farm in this county. At an early age he came to Plymouth and entered school, and having finished his academic studies entered the University of North Carolina, where he took up the study of law, graduating later with honors. Obtaining his license to practice law and being admitted to the bar, he came home and cast his lot among his own people, and by close attention to business and keeping always in touch with the advancement of the legal profession he ascended high upon the ladder of judicial fame, and won not only an enviable and lucrative practice at home, but a state-wide reputation as an able lawyer.

Mr. Gaylord was not possessed of those qualifications which fit men for great politicians, though he took an active interest in the political affairs of his State and Nation, and was several times honored with positions of trust by his people. He was several times elected Mayor of the town and was made Judge of the Recorder's Court of Washington County when that court was first established, which office he filled for two years with honor to himself and justice and mercy to the offenders who came before him. As a man he was gentle, kind and unassuming, loyal to his friends and just to his enemies.

About 30 years ago he professed religion and connected himself with the M. E. Church, and during these years even unto the setting of his life's sun, did he keep the faith. For years he was the faithful Superintendent of his Sunday school, and how well he filled this position, and how well the teachers and children loved him was most fittingly attested by the large concourse of people who followed his remains to the grave on Sunday morning at 11:00 o'clock, and by the beautiful floral offerings which bedecked his casket.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. B. T. Hurley, his pastor, who paid a most beautiful tribute to his life of love and fidelity to his church and his God.

The deceased leaves a widow, one daughter, Miss Lottie; three sons, T. J., L. W., and Avery, and one sister, Mrs. J. O. Everett, all of this town, besides a large circle of friends throughout the entire community to mourn his loss, to all of whom we extend our most sincere sympathy.

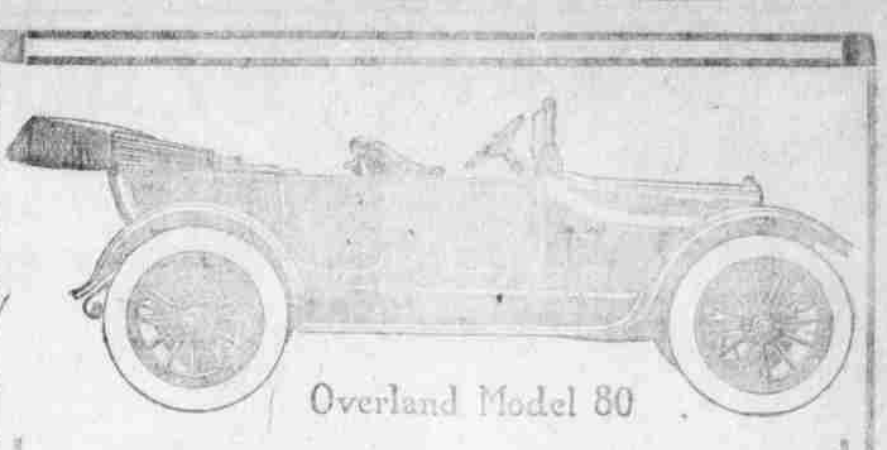
