Prof. E. T. Campbell came last week and has been busy preparing for the school opening Monday.

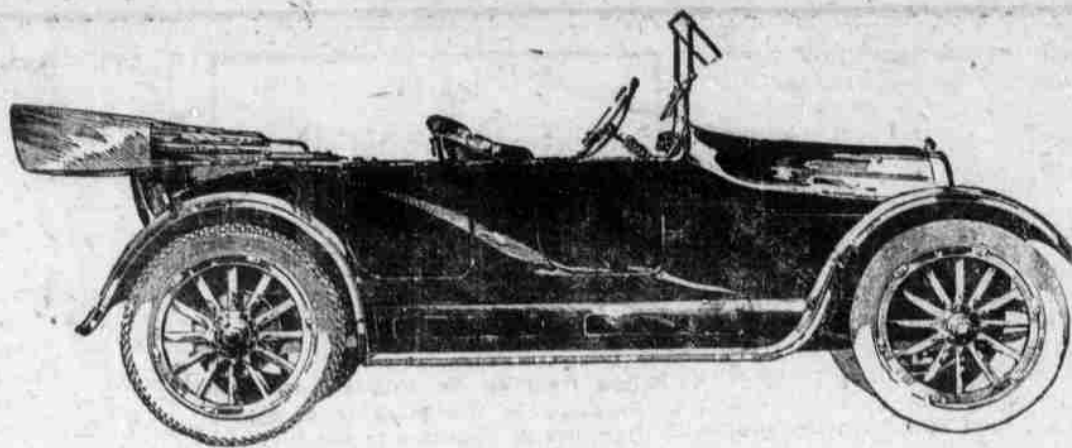
Miss Eva Spruill, Messrs. Roy Hopkins, James Swindell and others motored to Robersonville Sunday.

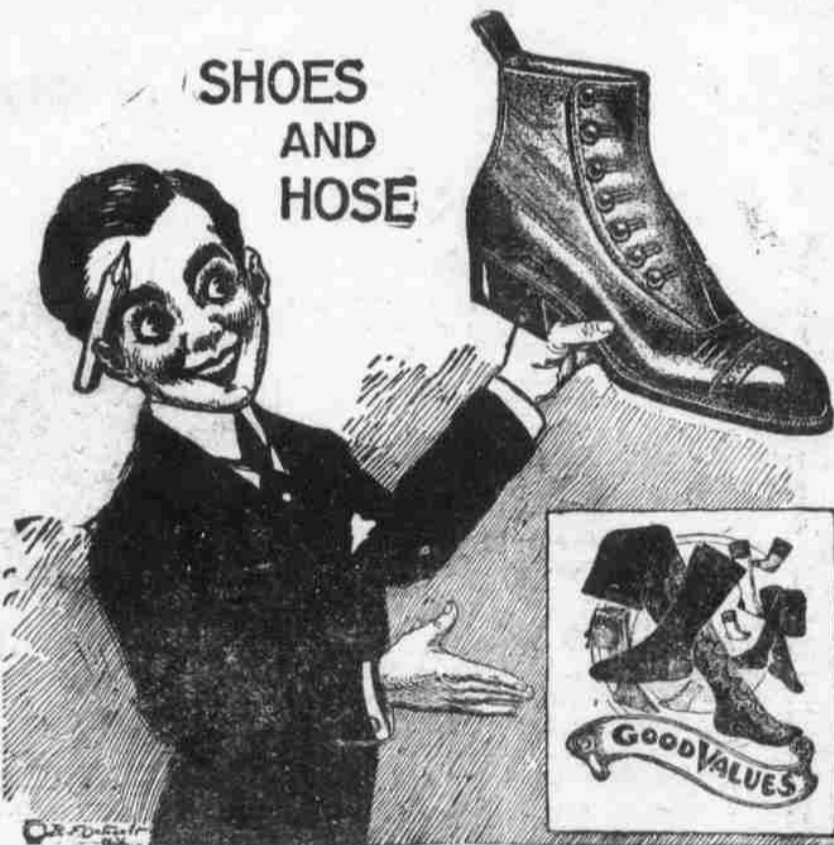
