A Tragical Accident.

Saturday last at about 11.30 o'clock Masters Thomas Basnight Durard and Willie Leary were in an up-stairs room at the home of Mr. W. T. Basnight, Holly Neck this County, looking at pictures belonging to young Basnight.

Master Herbert Hassell, a chum of the other boys, who was down stairs was invited up by his friends, and on entering the room, Willie Leary, age 11 years playfully pointed a 22 calibre revolver at him, and not knowing it was loaded, pulled the trigger. The bullet entered the right eye of young Hassell and he fell to the floor mortally wounded.

The boys becoming frightened hurried from the room and went to the older people and informed them of the dreadful accident. Dr. B. F. Halsey of Roper, was immediately summoned, and in 25 minutes was on the scene, but medical and surgical skill proved valueless, and the young victim passed to the great beyond in about two hours following the fatal and tragical accident.

Herbert was the son of Mr. C. P. Hassell, and the unfortunate lad who fired the fatal shot is the son of J. R. Leary.

Little Willie is almost prostrate with grief, and to him and his people and the bereaved we offer our most sincere and heartfelt sympathies.

The interment was made in Holly Neck church amid a concourse of sorrowful and grief-stricken friends and relatives; Rev. J. A. Mizelle performing the last sad rites.

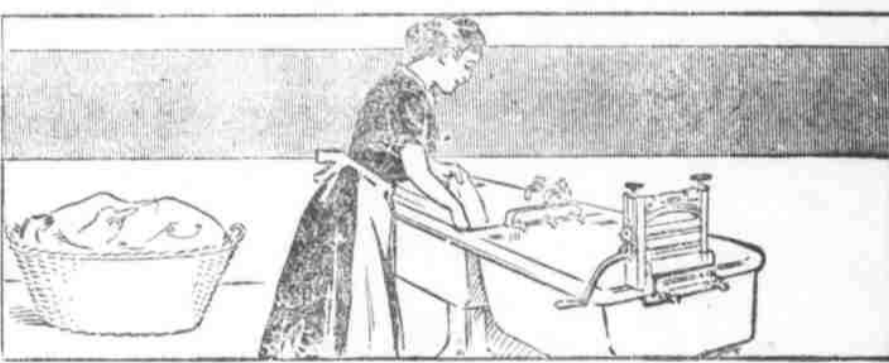
