Commissioners Proceeding.

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, March 5, 1917.

Present J. W. Starr, Chair, T. L. Satterthwaite and N. W. Spruill.

Minutes read and approved.

Upon petition it was ordered that an election be held at the School building in Creswell on April 11th, 1917, for the purpose of issuing \$15,000.00 bonds to enable said School district to erect a suitable school building, and to levy a special tax in said district of 15 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property and 45 cts. on the poll to provide for the liquidation of same. J. F. Belanger, Registrar, W. Bateman and W. D. Peal, poll holders.

Upon petition ordered that an election be held in District No. 12, on April 5, 1917, for the purpose of levying a special tax of 30 cents on the \$100.00 property valuation and 90 cents on the poll for school purposes in said district, T. F. Davenport, Registrar; C. B. Holmes and Alex. Davenport, poll holders.

Upon petition of the citizens of Roper the following resolution was adopted; that we will assist in building a public highway from Wenona, to connect with the public road at G. V. Lewis; Provided that the canal be constructed from Wenona to that point in question, G. V. Lewis' land, and that said road shall be constructed on the canal bank, and further that it is understood that the State Highway Commission shall contribute one-half of the cost of building said road, and after being constructed the county to accept same as a county road.
