Propage trust cook until soft and brain But the strike c juice for his minut sand pour it into jurs or glass bottles that have been steri ized by boiling for 15 minutes, filling the jars to overflowing. Seal the jars immediately. Stopper the bottles with corks sterilized in the same manner as the bottles, and make air tight seal by dipping the cork and the lip of the bottle into hot paraffin. When sugar is more follows; plentiful, fruit juices may be made into jelly.






