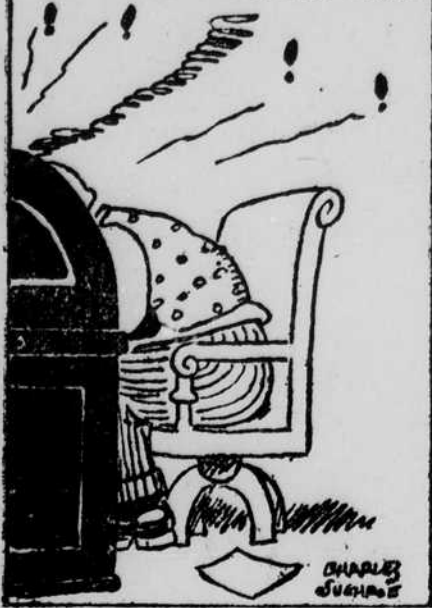


BILL BOOSTER SAYS
