An ordinance authorizing the issurance of bonds of the town of plymouth North Carolina, to the amount of for the purpose of constructing street and sidewall improvements in said town.

WHEREAS, it has been made to appear to the Board of Commissioners of ne town of Plymouth, North Carolina, nat certain street and sidewalk improgements are urgently necessary in the following streets of the said town

Water Street - From Monroe to Madison Streets inclusive. Washington St. irom Water Street to Alantic Coast Line Railroad.

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of this Board that said improvements should be made in a permanent and substantial manner, the streets to be constructed of bricks, blocks, sheet as halt, bitulithic or bituminous contrete, laid on a solid foundation or of oncrete, and the sidewalks to be con tructed of brick stone, concrete or other material of similiar lasting

WHEREAS, all of said improve-nents are a necessary expense of said wn, and

nEREAS, the current revenues said town are not sufficient to meet ie obligations imposed upon the town d at the same time provide money ith which to undertake and conruct said improvements. Now, Therefore, be it Ordained by ne Board of Commissioners of the

RED CROSS YEAR'S COST \$21,366,255

Nearly \$12,000,000 Devoted to Helping Victims of Great Japanese Earthquake.

OVER 3,000 BUSY CHAPTERS

Aid to Disabled War Veterans Paramount and Reaches Nearly \$4,000,000.

Washington .-- More than \$21,000,000 was the total of funds expended in all activities of the American Red Cross during the last fiscal year, ended June 30, says a statement issued by the National ceganization. This expenditure was almost onesixth of the amount of money disbursed by the Red Cross in the war year, July, 1917, to June, 1918. Of this extraordinary sum \$11,631,303 was America's contribution to the Red Cross for relief of the Japanese earthsuake victims. This was increased to \$11.768,803 by appropriations from general funds of the Red Cross, and it represented probably the largest spontaneous outpouring of beneficence of a single nation in the history of the

Over 3,000 active Chapters expended during the year \$4,869,000, the National organization disbursed \$16,497, 255.35, making the total \$21,366,255.35 -all for humanitarian work which reached practically around the world.

In announcing the year's record of American Rea Cross industry the ex-ecutive officials at Washington emphasize the fact that the extensive and never-halting work of the Red Cross depends almost wholly upon the nation-wide support of the organization from the memberships enrolled during the annual roll call which this year will be in progress from Nov. 11 to 27, when everyone is asked to join or renew their membership in the American Red Cross.

Soldier Service Paramount

Service in behalf of the disabled veterans of the World War and their families is a paramount obligation of the Red Cross. The organization, through its Chapters, is constantly in touch with this duty in 2,609 communities throughout the United Statesexpended \$1,735,825-a total of \$3,735,average attendance is almost two 825 applied to assisting war sufferers toward recovery from disability and

This work is constant in hospitals, sanitariums, camps, soldiers' homes, in the community. For example, in helping disabled men and women in places where they were transient resiproblems. Every Red Cross service is ever at hand ready to meet the in-

The enlisted men in the Regula Army, the Navy, and the Marine Corps, with their home ties, mean a never-ending Red Cross service which figures cannot fully interpret. In this work a total of \$685,285 was applied in meeting an obligation under the Red Cross charter which has been fulfilled for over 20 years.

Domestic Operations Extensive

In the past year Red Cross operations were almost wholly confined to continental United States and the insular possessions. Relief work following disasters called for immediate activities in 192 places and a total of \$737,603.87 was spent in this service alone. In 33 major disasters train workers were kept at the work of rehabilitation for many months.

In carrying on the health activities a total of \$444,886.66 from Red Cross national funds, and \$808,000 from Chapter treasuries-approprimately \$1.252. 886 in all-was applied, giving some idea of the extent of Red Cross service in the fields of public health nursing, nutrition instruction, and spreading knowledge of personal hygiene and care of the sick in the home.

For advancing the cause of human safety, the First Aid instruction, locally by Chapters and over extensive national territory by the Red Cross instruction car covering trunk line railroads, and in teaching water safety and increasing the membership of the Red Cross Life-Saving Corps the total cost was \$288.234.71, of which \$216,234.71 came out of national funds Army of Over 5,500.000

The Junior Red Cross in the schools with over 5,500,000 in its "I Serve" ranks-was aided with \$233.519.78 to which it is estimated the Chapters add ed some \$277,000-a total of \$510,510,78 In various other domestic activities the Red Cross spent \$283,473.19, and the Chapters in their numerous voluntary services expanded an additionat \$1.048,000 during the year.

Foreign obligations, aside from Japan, were mot with national funds as follows: Relief of refugees to Greece, \$200,887.18; Junior Red Cross projects, \$99.579.75; League of Red Cross Societies, \$165,000; other insular and foreign work, \$221.855.31. The American Red Cross budget for 1924-25 is \$4,647,790.85, or \$868,286.9\$ less than the budget for the year ended last June 30.
