County Sunday School Convention

The Sunday Schools of Washington County Will Hold Convention in Baptist Church Here April 16th and 17th.

Announcement is made of the Washington County Sunday School Convention for Sunday School workers of all denominations, which is to be held in the Baptist Church, Plymouth, N. C. on Thursday and Friday, April 16 and 17, 1925. The convention will open at 7:30 Thursday night April 16, and there will be three sessions on Friday, April 17, morning, afternoon and night.

The committee in charge of the arrangements for the convention is composed of the following prominent Sunday School workers of Plymouth, Rev. W. G. Lowe, Rev. O. W. Sawyer, Rev. W. A. Burroughs, and Rev. Theodore Patrick, Jr.

Outside speakers of the convention will be Mr. D. W. Sims, General Superintendent North Carolina Sunday School Association, Raleigh, and Miss Flora Davis Raleigh, Raleigh, Associate Superintendent of the same organization. In addition to these outside speakers, a number of the county's well known pastors and Sunday School workers will take part in the various sessions of the convention.

One interesting feature of the convention will be the presentation of a pennant to the Sunday School having present in the convention the largest number of representatives, sixteen years of age and over, according to the number of miles traveled. The number of representatives from each Sunday School will be multiplied by the number of miles from that Church to the Convention Church, and the Sunday School having the largest total will receive the pennant. It is expected that there will be much friendly competition for the pennant among the Sunday Schools of the county. The Sunday School which the convention is held in and others within one mile will not compete for the pennant.
