

Expansion Fund Louisburg College

Pastors of practically all of the Methodist Churches in the Elizabeth City District of the North Carolina Methodist Conference, and the lay representatives in each of the churches appointed as local church chairman for the Louisburg College Expansion Fund Campaign, will meet in the First Methodist church, of Elizabeth City Friday evening.

This meeting is being called by Rev. C. B. Culbreth, presiding elder of the Elizabeth City District and Mr. T. B. Leigh, of Elizabeth City, who are serving as district clerical chairman and district lay chairman, respectively.

Chairman Leigh will preside at the meeting, Rev. Culbreth will address the pastors and representatives on "Our Methodist College at Louisburg." The president of the college, Arthur W. Mohn, will relate the history and discuss the needs of the Methodist school for young women at Louisburg.

Of the half-million dollar expansion fund needed by the Louisburg College for additional buildings and an adequate endowment, \$150,000 was subscribed during the past summer by the residents of Louisburg and Franklin County. The remainder \$350,000 is to be raised among the methodist of the churches in the North Carolina Conference.

Firemen Relieved Of Poll Tax.

At the regular meeting of the board of councilmen last Friday night a resolution was passed relieving all members of the Plymouth Volunteer Fire Company of poll tax. This resolution was made law as soon as the town attorney, Zeb Vance Norman, had drawn it up in ordinance fashion.

The members of the company extend thanks to the councilmen for this recognition of the services, which oftentimes result in the destruction of clothing, origin of bad colds and perhaps other injuries.

Not For Taxation.

A request of the county auditor we are calling to the attention of farm and other property owners the requirement of the law that demands that each farm owner or his agent is to come to the list taker prepared to report the acreage of each crop to be harvested on his own and his tenants' farms this year also acres cultivated, lying out, number of bearing fruit trees, and the tons of fertilizer used for all crops.

This information is demanded for statistical purposes only, and will not affect the taxes of anyone. It is required by law, however, and such persons as it effects should immediately prepare their lists so that no time would be lost when they go to the list taker for the purpose of listing their property for taxes.

Asks Punishment Youth's Mutilators

New Jersey Woman Aided Needleman's Father When Fresh From Russia.

Kinston, April 22.—A Salem, N. J., woman who is a member of the Presbyterian church and a descendant of Massachusetts Bay colonists who came to this country in 1633, is "looking to North Carolina for the full punishment of all" who participated in the mutilation of Joseph Needleman, Kinston youth, by a mob near Williamston in March. She is directly interested, she states in a letter had here, because she has known Needleman "since he was a little boy" and has watched him "grow up to young manhood, recognizing in him qualities of honor, truthfulness and integrity."

The Jersey woman tells of the coming of Needleman's father to America years ago. "He had visions of freedom, peace, education for his children, the privilege of worshipping God according to the dictates of his own conscience with none to molest or make him afraid. He has been a good citizen, law-abiding and proud of his citizenship. To my knowledge he has put to shame some whose citizenship is theirs by right of birth." She "was of some assistance" to Needleman's father "during the years of waiting for citizenship. He came from Russia to escape hardship and persecution."

EASTERN TOWNS MAKE MANY IMPROVEMENTS.

Williamston, April 23.—A review of the town progress in this section indicates that extensive improvements are either now under way or under consideration says the Williamston Enterprise.

Plymouth is paving most of its important streets and putting down miles of sidewalks. They are preparing for a white-way street for the business section of the town.

Windsor is also paving some of her streets and making extensive improvements Ahleskie, which claims to be the hub of Hertford and Bertie counties, is also doing extensive paving.

In Martin County, Robersonville is showing the way by having her Main street paved. It is also considered probable that they will pave several other streets in that town.

Elizabeth City is also making large extensions to her paved streets, having already commenced the laying of six miles of new sidewalks.
