Quiet Election Here.

Very Slight Vote and Barely No Interest in Tuesday's Election

The municipal election held Tuesday was probably the quietest affair of its kind ever held here.

The first ward voted for S. A. Ward and Dr. Claudius McGowan who received seventeen and fifteen votes respectively. There was no opposition whatever in this ward.

The second ward selected D. O. Brinkley and Maurice Poteet, who each received ten votes. No one contested their election.

In the third ward, however, there were three candidates from which to select two councilmen. W. H. Gaylord led with fifty-nine votes, L. A. Peal next with thirty-two, while L. W. Gurkin received twenty-nine. The fact that there were three aspirants led to no fight whatever for a seat in the council room.

Messrs. Brinkley and Gaylord were members of the board during the past term. Thomas L. Smith, who represented the second ward, failed to announce his candidacy for the reason that he is contemplating leaving Plymouth in the near future and did not feel that he should serve further, thinking that it would better for his successor to get into harness as early as possible. T. C. Burgess and O. O. Jackson, who served the first ward, did not become candidates for reelection.

H. V. Austin, candidate to succeed himself as mayor, had no opposition. The new board will probably assume its duties on Friday night of next week.

The municipal election held in Roper Tuesday was marked by keen interest throughout the day and much campaigning was carried on for several days prior to the election.

Mr. G. J. Peal, candidate for mayor received sixty-two ballots against fifty-six which were cast for Dr. B. F. Halsey.

In the race for councilmanic honors Mr. J. J. Hassell received ninety-five votes, L. L. Cheson's twenty-three, L. J. Peacock sixty-three, W. A. Anisley fifty-eight and G. W. Dixon fifty-one. There seemed to be practically no opposition to Mr. Hassell. The three leading candidates were elected as the board of councilmen.
