The Missouri Entertainers.

The Radcliffe Chautauqua will open its entertainment features this year with concerts by one of the most popular organizations to be found in this country. The Missouri Entertainers, composed of four native born Missourians, are under the direction of Edward C. Barroll, known throughout the musical world as one of the most successful composers for the saxophone, and a performer on that instrument of extraordinary ability. His compositions, solos ensembles, instruction material, etc., are recognized as instruction, and in use wherever the saxophone is known and played. Mr. Barroll has earned a national reputation as Director of the famous Ludwig Saxophone Band, a St. Louis organization of fifty instrument. He is accompanied by Mrs. Barroll also nationally known among the greatest women saxophonists and by two other assisting artists.

The work of this company is highly artistic throughout. Its programs are novel, consisting of saxophone ensembles, duets and solos, vocal numbers, and readings. As an interesting diversion, Mr. Barroll will introduce original and exclusive violin trick-work, also the "flex-o-tone," a unique instrument somewhat resembling a "fly swatter", but capable of producing beautiful effects in the hands of an artist like Mr. Barroll.

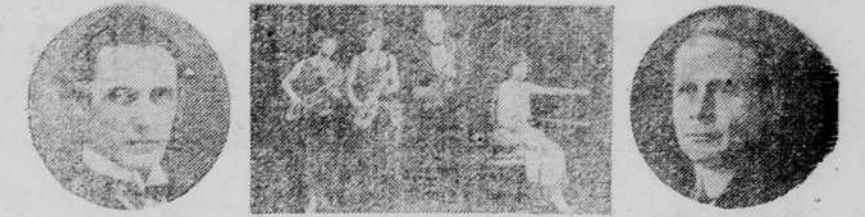

Miss Marcia Latham.

Miss Marcia Latham, daughter of Mr. S. W. Latham, deceased, was born in Plymouth October 20, 1878, and died May 9 and was laid to rest on May 10th in the family space in the Methodist cemetery. A large company of friends gathered to pay their last tribute to her memory. The service was conducted by Rev. Theodore Partrick and the writer.

Miss Latham was in her forty-sixth year. She received her education in some of the leading schools of America. At the age of sixteen she graduated from Norfolk College with highest honors. In 1899 she entered the university of North Carolina, being the first woman admitted. She graduated in two years. She taught two years in a Methodist college, in San Antonio, Texas. She taught one year in Elizabeth college, Charlotte, N. C. She did graduate work in Harvard and Columbia universities in 1904 and 1905. She taught mathematics in Hunter college, N. Y., from 1905, to 1922.

Intellectually she was above the average. As a teacher, she won by her superior qualities, the high esteem and affectionate regard of all with whom she came into contact, and whenever her lot was cast she was endowed with the faculty of making her students believe in themselves and the art of drawing out the very best from all; She was never a strong woman physically and the strain of her profession told on her health; yet she never spared herself, but went bravely on with her task. During her last days she was called upon to suffer greatly but there was not a murmur

heard from her. Her resignation was most beautiful; so beautiful was she in all the Christian grace that she became a shining light to all who knew her. Her education, her fine sense, her broad sympathies and her wide reading made her a person whose company was constantly sought. She never obtruded her opinions, but maintained that quiet grace that attracted many.

Her was a life rich in its fruit-ful usefulness. The fragrance of her life remains with us. A teacher, a scholar and a true Christian has been transplanted.
