

Wasteful feeding, rather than cost | proceeds to feed his cows 250 pounds of feed, is limiting the profit in dairying and poultry raising, according to the Larrowe Institute of Animal Economics. "Feed a good feed but don't waste it," is the slogan suggested for the dairyman or poultryman who would go forward in his business, rather than backwards.

"An investigation of the farmer's feeding problems has shown that there is a lamentable waste of good feed going on in nearly every barn in the country," the Institute states. "The same dairyman or poultryman who complains about a difference of five cents a sack between two feeds, will waste many times that amount through his methods of feeding.


"Here is a typical illustration. If a

This is more than the good feed would have cost if properly used, and the cows, getting the lower grade of feed, fall off in milk production, so that the farmer can't save on the feed bill enough to overcome the loss on his milk check. This should prove to any dairyman that it is more profitable to feed 200 pounds of good feed at a daily cost of \$5.50 and get \$15.00 worth of milk, than to feed 250 pounds of cheaper grade at \$5.62 and get only \$10.00 or \$12.00 worth of milk.



But if instead of feeding each cow exactly 10 pounds per day, he guesses at the weight by the scoop-shovel methods, he is likely to give the 20 cows 250 pounds, or 1214 pounds apiece, and his feed bill becomes \$6.87 instead of \$5.50. Now, supposing that at this rate of cost the dairyman finds his operations are not sufficiently profitable, the first thought to come into his mind is to buy a cheaper feed. So instead of buying a feed that costs him \$2.75 a sack, or \$55.00 a ton, he buys a feed that costs

economically as possible so that even if he sells at a low price he can still make a fair income, but he cannot do this unless he knows what his actual costs are and the points where these may be shifted with a view of inereasing production and decreasing labor and investment costs on eachcan of milk or dozen of eggs produced.
