The question of an improved road on Long Acre consumed the entire session of the chamber of commerce Monday night. This meeting was advertised and a large attendance was urged, but only the usual crowd was present and the proposition was thoroughly discuss-

There has been some agitation to have this road improved on Long Acre until it reaches the turnpike leading to Wenona and the improvement continue in that direction until it merges with the hard surfaced road at Pantego. The disposition of the state highway commission, as it was claimed, is to continue the road to Acre Station and then go in an easterly direction until it connects with the improved road leading into Swan Quarter, the capital of Hyde.

A motion endorsing the intentions of the highway commission was entertained and unanimously passed.

There will be no meeting of the chamber of commerce next Monday night, but regular weekly meetings will be resumed on Monday night, January 3rd.


