COUNTY BONDS SOLD

Seventeen bond buyers representing as many firms were present at the sale of the Washington county bonds which were sold at auction in the office of the county auditor at the courthouse on Tuesday afternoon. The sealed bids were opened and rejected and the bonds auctioned off to the highest bidder. This proved to be the most profitable bond sale that has been held in this county for sometime.

The highest bidders were Durey & Marr, of Raleigh and Otis & Company, Cleveland, Ohio. The bonds were sold jointly for par and premium of \$1,210.00 the \$150,000.00 bonds bringing \$151,210.00 to bear interest at the rate of 4 1/2%, the bidders to pay expense of legal opinion, furnish bond forms and pay accrued interest.

UNION STATION OPENS SOON

The recently constructed Union Station on the Southern end of Washington Street will open about the first of May, according to information obtained from M. T. Bradshaw, local agent of the Norfolk Southern Railroad. A definite date for the opening has not been set. However, Mr. Bradshaw, thinks it probable that the opening will be near this time. The station is completed but the opening has been delayed because the seats have not yet arrived.

This beautiful small building has three rooms excluding the ticket office. Two of these rooms will accommodate the passengers while the third will be used as a baggage room. The total expenditure for erection of this building amounts to about \$13,000.

The station will be equipped as a much larger station, with the modern Arcola hot air heating system and a splendid lighting system with four 75 candle power lights adorning the front and two lights over the street between the two tracks. Large windows will furnish the ventilation. Each passenger room is equipped with two toilets and a lavatory.

There will be two porters, one for the day shift and another for the night. Each company will send their ticket agent to the train previous to the arrival of their respective trains. No night tickets will be sold at the present.

The Norfolk Southern train between Raleigh and Norfolk will not back up to the Water street station as heretofore. All passengers will either get on or off at the Union station.

Heavy Frost Here

Farmers coming into town this week reported that a killing blanket of frost, very much resembling a light snow, descended Sunday night and laid waste to May pea blossoms.

The effect of this unseasonable frost is expected to belate the crop and to greatly diminish the yield. Optimistic planters are consoling themselves with the thought that a short crop will demand higher prices. Damage is also reported in the potato crop.

Improving Freight Station

The Norfolk and Southern freight station on the West end of Water street is undergoing extensive repairs. When finished the total expenditure will be about \$1500. This improvement was made necessary by an increase of business. The station will receive a new roof and a new platform with a new wiring system installed. The plans include the enlarging of the present building. The office will be remodeled and the boat docks improved.
