NOTICE! AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE PARKING OF AUTOMOBILES AND VEHICLES IN THE TOWN OF PLYMOUTH

THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF PLYMOUTH DO ENACT: 1. That no automobile, motor truck or horse drawn vehicle shall be parked on the streets of the Town of Plymouth, except on the north side of the streets running in an eastwardly and westwardly direction...
