SECOND AUTO PLANS FOR NEW HOTEL FASTLY DEVELOPING

The new hotel will be a five story affair with about fifty rooms. The cost of building and equipping this new hostelry will amount to about \$60,000. All modern hotel conveniences will be found in the new hotel Running water and a modern system of steam heat will be installed, There will be about four rooms on This makes the second automo. the bottom floor to rent for stores. from both Washington and Main streets. A spacious parking place for automobiles will be prepared on

the rear of the hotel lot. The church folk have unde sideration a plan to sell their lot and purchase the lot on Main street which is now occupied by the old Hampton Academy. They will renovate the walls of the old school house and build new partitions and remodel the building as they like. Definite steps have been taken to realize this movement as a success. however, nothing definite has been decided. The leaders of the Christian church have written an architect to draw plans for the remodeling of the old building and give an estimate of the expenditure for the undertaking. The price of the lot for the hotel company is contingent upon the report of the architect.
