NEW METHOD TO SUBDUE TREE BORER

Paradichlorobenzene has proved very effective in the control of the peach tree borer. If this material is applied in the right manner and at the proper time 90 per cent to 100 per cent control can be expected. This method of borer control has been thoroughly tested and growers are advised to use it regularly each year.

In the experience of the U. S. Bureau of Entomology, Fort Valley Georgia, paradichlorobenzene can be used on trees four years of age and older with safety. However if two and three-year old trees are badly infested, one-half ounce of paradichlorobenzene can be used with slight chance of injury to the trees.

For trees four and five years of age three-fourths of an ounce of paradichlorobenzene should be applied to each tree. For trees six years of age and older a full ounce of the chemical should be applied. For very old trees with large trunks an ounce and a fourth of paradichlorobenzene should be applied.

Paradichlorobenzene should be applied between September 25 and October 10, in North Carolina. This date of application must be closely followed if best results are to be obtained.

Scrape away gum from trunk of tree and make the soil level and apply the crystals in a continuous ring about an inch wide and about an inch from the trunk of the tree. The crystals should not be placed too far from the tree and care should be observed to avoid pushing any crystals against the trees.

VIOLATOR OF DRY LAW TRIED

Judge Zeb Vance Norman, in Recorder's Court here Tuesday afternoon, ordered a mistrial in the case of John Atamanchuk, who was charged with violating the prohibition law, when the jury failed to agree after deliberating for some time. The case consumed the afternoon session.

Atamanchuk was apprehended Saturday night by Chief Brown and was arraigned before the court on four charges filed by Solicitor Carl Bailey, as follows: reception, transportation, possession of spirituous liquors for sale and for possessing this whiskey off his premises.

Chief Brown stated that he walked up on an automobile operated by Atamanchuk, on Water street, at dusk Saturday evening and in plain view saw Mrs. Marie Choppick deliver a gallon of whiskey to the defendant. When he approached Atamanchuk he threw the whiskey out of the car. This was produced as evidence. Atamanchuk alleges that the whiskey might have been hid there by some one else and insists that he knew nothing of the whiskey.

Mrs. Choppick was arrested on a similar charge although the case has not been called for trial.

Negro Shot By Unknown Person

Dawson Lee, 60 year-old, colored farmer of near here, was mysteriously shot Tuesday morning while in a corn crib at work on his premises. A small calibre rifle was used by the unknown assailant. The bullet hit the negro in the neck and glanced when it struck a bone. No serious injury was sustained. Lee fails to recall to mind any person that would commit the crime for revenge. No clues of the assailant were revealed other than the bullet. Some think it was a stray bullet from the rifle in the hands of a youthful hunter.

TWO INJURED IN AUTO-TRAIN CRASH
