To all owners of real and personal property and tax payers of Washington County

On the 5th day of April, 1930, list takers will begin taking the lists of property for taxes at its true value in money at April first.

By order of the Board of County Commissioners, list taking will continue until April 30th, 1930, after which the legal penalty for failure to list property will be invoked upon each person who neglects to list his property for taxation. The new law is very strict on failure to list, and we trust that our list of delinquents to turn over to the Grand Jury at close of listing season will be extremely small. EVERY DOG MUST BE LISTED.

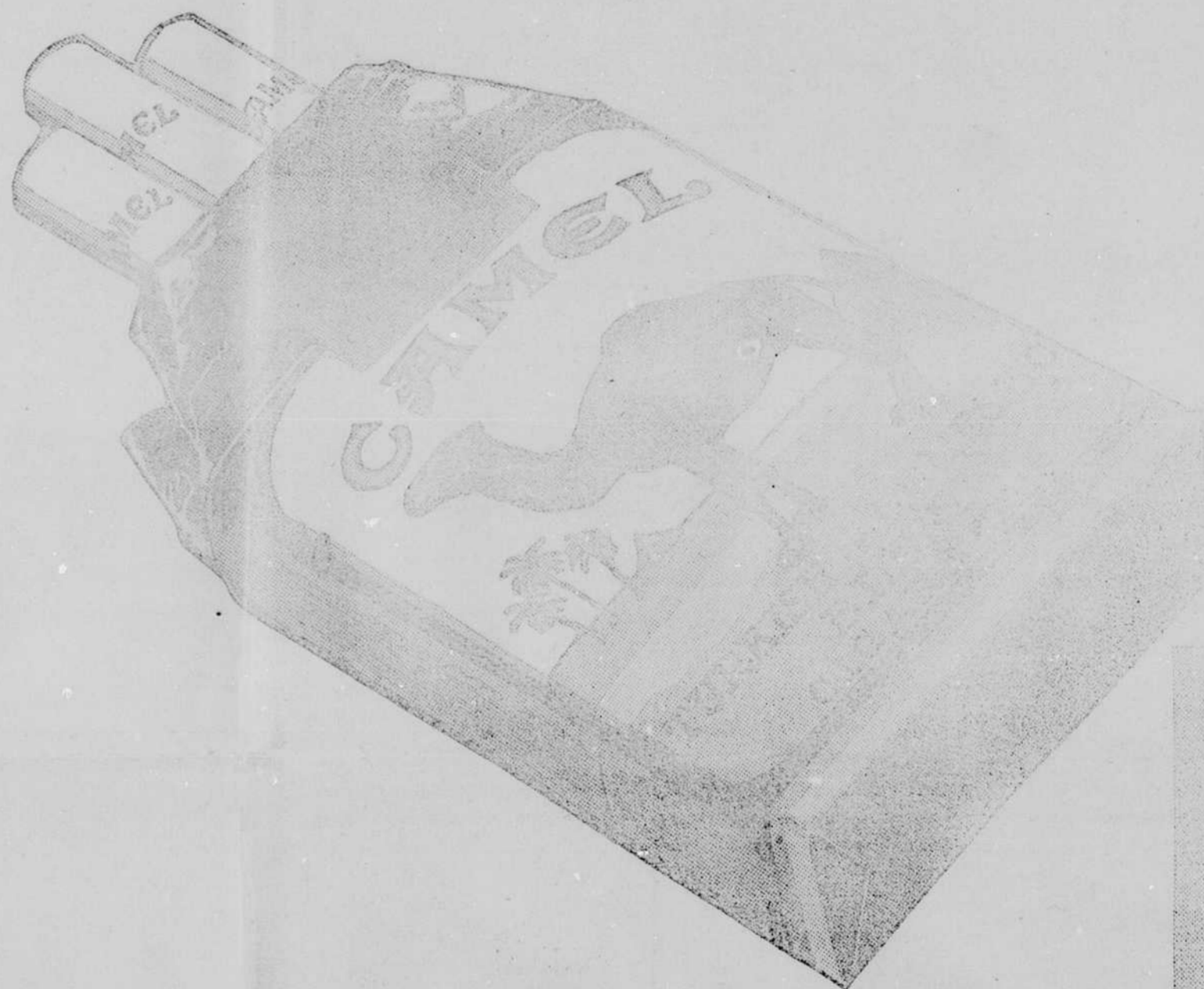
