trate of Soda people are giving these women a one-hundred pound bag of Nitrate of Soda to be used in these gardens. A ten dollar steam pressure cooker and a seven-fifty pressure cooker has been offered as prizes in this Garden Contest.

Four hundred dollars worth of eggs were graded and shipped to Wilmington during the month. These eggs are to be processed, stored and sold next fall. The shippers will receive the difference in the market price now and the market price in the fall less storing charges of 15 cents per crate per month. Sales on the curb market amounted to \$705.68 during the month. Two hundred and fifty women attended the federation meeting at Mackeys on March 28th. The Creswell Home Demonstration Club was the winner of the lovely trophy cup presented to the Clubs by the Chamber of Commerce. A mutual Exchange has been organized through the Farm and Home agents with the help of Mr. L. C. Salter, Marketing Specialist.

April

The County Commissioners, Board of Education and Superintendent of Schools were given a dinner at the courthouse on the first Monday in the month. The chicken for this dinner was cooked by the same meeting cooking process demonstrated to the women in the clubs during the month of March.

The subject for study during the month was Meat Substitutes. This was one of the most interesting lessons given. The women were shown how a one-dish meal could be prepared in twenty minutes, which cost less than the usual Sunday night supper. Five hundred and eighty dollars worth of eggs have been shipped to Wilmington to date. Total sales on the curb market now amount to \$2,702.62.

Ninety-five club meetings have been held, 3,054 miles have been traveled, 28 new members have been added, 74 office calls, and 41 calls by telephone. 42 press articles written, and 1,100 circular letters mailed during this period.
