### Too Much Money-In One Place

Our banks have too much money

Since the natural shrinkage of values during the past twelve years from war-time inflation to what should rightly be normal times rather than subnormal, such as we now have, we have had many bank crashes. This has caused a great scare among both the bankers and depositors, the depositors fearing a "bust", and the bankers fearing a run. This condition has kept many millions of dollars in the old stockings of skeptics and billions more dollars locked in the banks to fortify them against runs.

The banks of this country are said to have hoarded in their vaults forty per cent more cash than the legal reserve banking laws require, which of itself causes "hard times." If that 40 per cent was floating in the channels of business, things would be entirely different in business circles. And we need not look for much improvement so long as this condition prevails.

Now that the dollar is the only American unit that has any value, it should be forced out to perform its proper function of exchange. If our government will force the forty per cent of cash, now hoarded in the banks, out and place it in the hands of legitimate exchangers, and at the same time guarantee them against wildcat runs by depositors then things will begin to pick up.

No business in our country has a friend today except the gold dollars, and they are all locked up, while business is drifting and sinking, and millions are hungering.

If our government is going to permit its gold to sleep in the idle coffers of the rich, then it should give the poor some basis of value-in, silver, in wheat, sand, stone, or wood, and not let gold crush and curse the world. Get the money out of the banks, and protect them against panics.

Truly, this is a day of extremes. Men flying across wide oceans, but going nowhere, millions whooping up the world series, and more millions perched on poverty row, not knowing where they will find food, warmth, or shelter this winter.

Perhaps no age has experienced more cases of extreme joy and sorrow, poverty and riches. Most of us charge our misfortunes to some particular cause. However, our troubles generally come from acts of direct disobedience to reason. We blame the laws, we blame the officials; in fact, we are prone to blame everything and everybody except ourselves.

We lose our fortunes because we fail to follow the dictates of certain well-defined econmic laws. We all know that no business stands which spends more than it takes in, and that is our biggest trouble right now. If we have spent for nothing except the things we needed, we are not to blame. But if he have squandered our income for things that we did not need, and that did us no good, then we should not complain.

When we confine ourselves to the principle of spending no more than we earn we will soon get back on a safe and sound basis.

## The Week-End Habit

It is said that the dean of Wake Forest College thinks that, instead of hitch-hiking home or elsewhere at week-ends, students should stay at the college and study. Other deans and professors doubtless have the same opinion. Undoubtedly the habit of weekend visiting and hitch-hiking and home-going militates against continuous study and associations which are helpful. Week-end visits have contributed toward lessening formal debates and informal discussions among students which were formerly reckoned as important parts of college advantages.

The old-time social and church and college community interest were all promoted when students rarely left the college campus. Church and Sunday school attendance and the like are broken into, and the atmosphere of the college home feeling has too often given place to a sort of wanderlust that does no good to the mastery of the college cause or to the best college spirit. At least that is the way it looks to some deans and others.
