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DEFER TEST CASE BY COUNTY MAN ON TOBACCO TAX

A. L. Alexander Sues for Recovery of Penalties Levied

An order has been received by A. L. Alexander, of Plymouth, directing a deferring of a hearing on his case against C. H. Robertson, collector of internal revenue for the State of North Carolina; J. O. Carr. and proprietors of the Planters Warehouse, Williamston, until a test case has been decided by the United States Supreme Court.

Mr. Alexander is suing the interal revenue collector and the others to recover penalties imposed upon nim for growing tobacco without contract and selling it on the tobacco market in Williamston.
