Hampton Reappointed To State Conservation Board

W. R. Hampton has received notification from Governor Clyde R. Hoey of his reappointment to membership on the board of the North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development.

Having already served for two years, Mr. Hampton's new appointment is for six years, his term of office expiring in June, 1945.

Well known throughout the state as a commercial fisherman, Mr. Hampton's knowledge of this work is highly regarded by state officials. The Hampton family has operated the Kitty Hawk and Slade fisheries on Roanoke River near here for almost a century.


