Says School Plant And Facilities Must Be Expanded Here

At Least 112 Additional Students Expected Before January, 1941

Faced with the prospect that the school population of the Plymouth school district will be increased by families with 112 school children prior to January 1, 1941, educational officials here are confronted with the necessity of planning a building program to provide additional classroom space in a building which is already congested. The 112 added children will entitle the local school to three extra teachers, it was said by H. H. McLean, county superintendent of schools, in a talk before 75 members of the parent-teacher association at a meting last night in the local high chool auditorium

Mr. McLean said that an authoritative survey of prospects for the increased school population had been made at his suggestion by the management of the North Carolina Pulp Company, who are expecting 70 or more families to come here, principally from Richwood, W.
