Making Plans for Round-Robin Event At Golf Club Here

Handicaps Announced and Seven Teams Selected for New Tourney

Handicaps have been worked out for 22 golfers which makes them eligible for entry in the round-robin handicap tournament at the Plymouth Country Club, it was announced this week by Ellis Maples, professional. Partners have been selected by seven pairs, and Maples plans to begin play in the event as soon as 10 teams are available. The tournament will be a best-ball of pair event, with scoring done on a plus-and-minus basis, and every team meeting every other in a 18-hole match-play round.

Mr. Maples also said he had been assured \$125 of the \$150 prize money he is seeking to stage a pro-amateur tournament, sanctioned by the district Professional Golfers Association, some time about the middle of September. If he can secure the additional \$25, it is believed a very successful tournament will be held on the local course, with several big-name pros in the list of entries. He has not yet had a reply from George Slingerland regarding date for the event.

Coming back to the round-robin tournament, Mr. Maples hopes to secure the required number of entries and announce pairings for the first round of play by Sunday.
