Members of the Round Dozen Bridge Club were the invited guests and each one presented a gift to Mrs. Harper, who left here yesterday to make her home elsewhere.

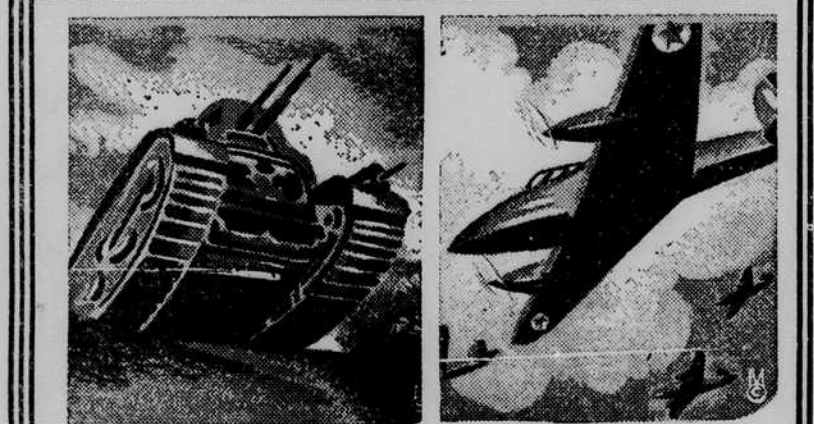
Pleasant Grove W. S. C. S. Meets Thursday Afternoon
